Description of the physical part (start and end date, duration, activities, goals, expected results)	<p>As part of the physical mobility in Tallinn, there will be an introductory lecture and a series of lectures/seminars culminating in a workshop.</p> <p>The introductory lecture will provide a closer introduction to the host institution (including student faculty associations and faculty life) and the schedule of the stay.</p> <p>Lectures/seminars will take place in the morning, and practical applications of the lectures' material, such as excursions and visits, will be scheduled for the afternoon. The lectures/seminars will be held for a total of 180 minutes (4 academic hours). One study trip, where a lecture will take place during the transportation, seminars-talks in the objects (8 hours in total).</p> <p>The workshop will focus on current issues in linguistic and cultural studies of an urban space. During the workshop, students will have the opportunity to share experiences with students and educators from other institutions.</p> <p>As part of the workshop, students will be given a learning task related to the subsequent virtual mobility, which is a requirement for completing the course.</p>

The seminars will be integrated into the lecture schedule after physical mobility, providing students with the opportunity to present their individual work and projects. The virtual sessions are planned to take place both before and after the in-person component of the course.</p> <p>In case of questions, students can request a consultation during the scheduled time.</p> <p>Teaching materials will be shared via Moodle.</p>

This section also provides an introduction to multilingual studies and explores the history of cultural diversity in Estonia, setting the foundation for further discussions on linguistic and cultural dynamics in urban spaces.</p> <p><u>May 5, 2025 - May 30, 2025</u> 15.05. (1/1)</p> <p>The goals of the second virtual part are to give students the opportunity to work independently on their projects using all the advantages of asynchronous hybrid learning, and to provide a secure and safe environment to present the project to the coursemates without stress while being at home.</p>
